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Senator Brown Receives Action Ohio's Legislative Leadership Award

State Senator Edna Brown (D-Toledo) was honored last week by the Action Ohio Coalition for Battered Women at their Empty Place at the Table 35th Anniversary Meeting and Award Presentation Luncheon in the Statehouse Rotunda.

"This is a tremendous organization that helps people often forgotten by society victims of domestic violence," said Senator Brown. "Receiving an honor like this is truly gratifying. It is also a reminder of a very real problem that we must continue to address. I will continue to be a strong advocate for those that have survived such horrific ordeals.'

The Legislative Leadership award was given for Senator Brown's tireless efforts to pass Teen Dating Violence Legislation, HB 10, which provide protection orders for juvenile victims abused by juveniles.

Senator Brown authored House Bill 10 in the 128th General Assembly as a State Representative. It became effective law on June 17, 2010. House Bill 10 is named the "Shynerra Grant Law," after a Toledo teenager killed by a former boyfriend in 2005.

Action Ohio's mission is to promote quality programs, services, and resources to survivors of domestic violence. Their goal is to ensure equal rights and empowerment for all individuals as they work toward the eradication of family violence in our society.



Veteran's Quick Thinking Saves Fellow Paratrooper

It was a warm and sunny day in Ft. Bragg, NC. The weather was perfect for a paratrooper to take a jump. On June 6, 1956 Wilbur Lewis's company of the 82nd Airborne Division was on a routine exercise with the 325 Regiment. They were scheduled to make parachute jumps.

On this particular day, after Lewis jumped from the airplane, his parachute was opened and then he heard a large thump. That thump was fellow paratrooper PFC Charlie Harper.

Harper had landed on top of Lewis's fully blossomed parachute because his had failed to open. Lewis grabbed Harper as he slid down the suspension lines of his chute. Lewis told Harper not to open his reserved parachute.

If Harper had opened his reserve parachute, Leis realized, both chutes would have been entangled. Both men would have been killed if the chutes were entangled. Due to Lewis's quick thinking

both men descended arm-inarm to the ground. Even with the added weight to Lewis's chute, which increased the speed of the drop, both men landed safely to the ground.

Toledo resident Wilbur Lewis was born on Augus 18, 1931. He is the husband of Odestia Lewis. Lewis has five children, 11 grandchildren (one deceasd) and two great-grandchildren. Lewis served as a paratrooper in the Korean War with the 187th Regimental Combat Team. He received a Purple Heart because he was wounded in combat.

He is a retiree from the

Toledo Sanitation Department and is currently a school bus driver for Toledo Public Schools. Lewis is a dedicated member of Bethlehem Baptist Church where he serves as a deacon. He memorized Psalm 23 as a young child and recalled it many times while in combat and still recites it today.

Celebrations to Honor Veterans Set for Nov. 11

As veterans across the nation and around the world are honored Nov. 11, a Veterans Day celebration will be held on The University of Toledo Main Campus to give those who served a chance to reconnect with each other and to provide the public an opportunity to thank the men and women who keep our country safe.

A breakfast for veterans will be served at 8:45 a.m. at Savage Arena followed by a presentation at 9:30 a.m. A ceremony of remembrance open to the public will begin at 11 a.m. at the UT Veterans' Plaza, located on the northwest corner of Centennial Mall. Transportation from the arena to and from the plaza will be provided.

The celebration is sponsored by the Lucas County Commissioners, the American Red Cross of Greater Toledo, the Lucas County Veterans Service Commission, Block Communications and UT.

Lt. Col. Jonathan Beasley, chairman of UT's Department of Military Science, will give the keynote speech during the morning breakfast.

"This is an opportunity to thank veterans for their service and a reminder to everyone that in times of need, there always have been men and women who rise to serve the nation," Beasley said. "We need to be sure we recognize their efforts and never take for granted those who volunteer."

Lee Armstrong, a retired U.S. Navy veteran and exceutive director of the Lucas County Veterans Service Commission, noted that according to the last census, only 10 percent of Ohioans have served in the armed forces. "Certainly the families of armed services members

Who Was Leroy Wilton Homer Jr.?

In September, America marked the 10^{m} Anniversary of 9/11. A tragedy that seems as if it only happened a short while ago. One thing that some people might observe and question is what was the impact of 9/11 on African Americans. The majority of 9/11 media focus has been on white families and white children.

Leroy Wilton Homer Jr. was an African-American first officer operating the flight that tragically fell in an act of terrorism in Shanksville, Pennsylvania on Sept. 11, 2001. Pilot Homer's plane was the fourth attacked that day.

The Long Island, New York native dreamed of flying as a child. He was only 15 years old when he started flight instruction in a Cessna 152. By the time he was 18, Homer had obtained his private pilot's license. That same year, he joined the Air Force and became a second licutenant. He served in Operations Desert Storm and Desert Shield and later supported efforts in Somalia. During his tenure, Homer was named the 21st Air Force Air Crew Instructor of the Year. Homer achieved the rank of captain before his honorable discharge from active duty in 1995.

For his actions on board Flight 93, Homer received many posthumous awards and citations, including honorary membership in the historic Tuskegee Airmen, the Congress Of Racial Equality's Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Award, the SCLC Drum Major for Justice Award and the Westchester County Trailblazer Award.

Homer is survived by his wife, Melodie, and daughter, Laurel.

"Our leadership is fueled by our spirituality," says McClellan. "The church is where we first got our leadership experience."

To that end, Alston and McClellan analyzed the various aspects of leadership in the lives of Fannie Lou Hamer, Septima Clark, Mary McLeon Bethune, Shirley Chisholm, Barbara Jordan and Andre Lorde. The authors chronicle the careers of these women and uses their leadership models as units of analysis for current practices

Examining their lives, says McClellan, resulted in a more complex and complete pic-



cial assistant to the vice president of Student Affairs where she was responsible for implementing organization development techniques to streamline division operations.

At Lourdes, McClellan's leadership of the Masters of Organizational Leadership program has resulted in a 25 percent increase in the diversity of the student population.

Next up for McClellan is a project on the "glass cliff" phenomenon, she says. That will entail an examination of "how women and people of color are given opportunities to lead but in such high-risk situations '

Typical of corporations and organizations, says McClellan, is the practice of offering minorities and woman positions of such difficulty primarily because no one else would want to be placed in those situations. Also typical, she says, is the result.

"After a miracle is performed," she notes, so often such miracle workers "are let go from the company."

During their visit, the group had the chance to meet with several high school teachers and administrators and observe classes in English-as-second-language, calculus and chemistry. The lecture presentation will take place from 2:30-4 p.m. in College Hall Room 099.

International Education Week activities will conclude on Thursday, Nov. 17, as Owens Adjunct Instructor of Business Faustina Asiedu will provide details specific to life in the country of Ghana as part of a lecture presentation titled "Ghana: Culture, History and People". The presentation will occur from 3-4:30 p.m. in College Hall Room 160. Asiedu will also share details about the country's origins as well as insight into the culture and history. 

Be Sure You Stay Eligible For Your Benefits

While young men may think government benefits are just for their elders, in fact, they may be eligible for many federal, state and municipal benefits programs right now. It's important, however, to make sure you stay eligible by registering with the Selective Service System.

Opportunities for Young Men

Male students who need help paying for college will find that registering with the Selective Service opens up all doors to federal financial aid. This includes everything from Pell Grants to College Work Study to Guaranteed Student/PLUS Loans. Plus, those who sign up with the Selective Service System are eligible for federal job training via the Workforce Investment Act, as well as numerous federal jobs. Registering is also the only path to citizenship for immigrant men arriving in the U.S. before their 26th birthday.

Required by Law According to U.S. law,

According to U.S. law, S virtually all male citizens and the

immigrants need to register with the Selective Service System. Historically, young men have had to do this during the 60-day window that begins 30 days before their 18th birthday and continues for 30 days afterward. This still holds true, but with Early Submission, it is now possible to submit your registration information as long as you are at least 17 years and 3 months of age.

Registration applies to all young men-even those living overseas. Those who are immigrants must likewise register, regardless of immigration status.

Where and How to Register

Online registration: Log on to www.sss.gov and click on the registration icon. It takes only a minute to complete the online form. When you submit your information, you will receive a registration number instantly.

The U.S. Postal Service: Visit any U.S. Postal Service branch to obtain a Selective Service "mail-back" registration form. Men living overseas may register at any U.S. embassy or consular office.

By mail: Eligible men may also register by filling out a reminder mail-back card. Selective Service will send this card to any young man around the time he turns 18. Mail-back cards are also available at some post offices.

The federal student aid form: Another easy way to register for Selective Service is by checking a box on the application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA form). Checking "yes" on box 29 of this form will alert the Department of Education to provide Selective Service with the information to register you.

School: Most high schools appoint a staffmember or teacher to serve as Selective Service Registrar. They help to register young men and answer questions.

School Change Must Come from Outside

For the last 43 years, I've served as a teacher, principal, and school district superintendent with the sole goal of helping all children receive a quality education. Much of my career has been spent working in urban districts where generations of low-income, minority children have been forced to attend violent, chronically failing schools. In many communities, our public-education system has returned to separate and unequal. Access to a quality education is the civil rights battle of our generation.

Before my tenure as superintendent of the Philadelphia School District, I had always believed the best way to improve access to quality education for low-income families was to implement needed reforms from within the education system. Recently. I've come to a sad realization. Real reform will never come from within the system because too many powers that be (the teachers' union, politicians, consultants, vendors, etc.) have a vested interested in maintaining the status quo that is failing our children.

Meaning ful education reform must be forced upon the system from outside by giving parents of all income levels real choices about where their children go to school. That requires giving parents comprehensive school choice that includes an expanded

charter-school system and a
 voucher program for low-in come parents with children
 trapped in a failing school.

The debate about improving failing urban schools has raged for decades, but solutions have been unacceptably slow in coming. Unless

progress in student achievement accelerates, it will be 2123 before all children are at grade level in reading and math. During that time, we will continue to lose an increasing percentage of African American and Latino males to the criminal-justice system and an increasing percentage of Philadelphians will be sentenced to a permanent underclass requiring increased social services. The lack of quality education harms the community as a whole. We can do better.

Just by virtue of reading this article, you understand how much books bring to your life. You know how they take you away to an other place and time. You can learn from a book, laugh or cry, find ideas, get comfort, or get provoked.




