# The Substance of Hope

Black males today live in a world that pays them the most attention when they are violently acting out. -Bell Hooks



The violence perpetrated by young African-American males upon each other continues unabated despite the springing up of several highprofile and under the radar community "coalitions for hope." Eventually, someone will finally "get it" and ask the right question.

What is it about our <u>system</u>, which enables the violence by black males upon black males to thrive and survive?

The answer? To put it succinctly, It's the drugs! Young black males, through mediums of mass media, view the accumulation of massive wealth by society's "heroes" at the same time that they realize that they themselves are not privy to similar wealth despite America's claim of freedom and equality for all.

This amounts to what scholar Toby Jenkins (2006) calls "social teasing." When you tease and "dangle food before a starving individual," states Jenkins, "not only will the teasing spark a level of insanity, but it will also drive the person to do almost anything to obtain the food."

Many young black males today living in poverty are desperate. They will do anything to make money and are not motivated by the abstract values of previous generations such as freedom.

Rather, rage, vented through channels of violence and crime and fueled by a lack of access to economic opportunity, finds welcoming places in the "alternative social structures of inclusion provided by gang culture and in prisons."

The tangible materialism of drugs and violence most always trumps empty hope for "Black men who live in poverty, who have been shut out of employment and the economic infrastructure of America, who have been socially outcast from society, and who constantly confront death whether it be immediately in their own violent neighborhood or slowly via inadequate health care, nutrition, and stress, all caused by society's power structure."

What will provide hope with substance and provide a context for the positive engagement of young black males in society?

Quality education and equity in learning opportunities have almost become a cliche. But schools are a key and the community must come together to ensure that schools work for all.

A strong interest in education has always existed in the African-American community. But the contemporary educational arena must learn to understand and adequately serve young black men, helping the school experience become a nurturing and encouraging environment that can effectively counter the culture of the street or the black child's home life. It should also equip teachers with quality cultural sensitivity and diversity training that enables them to stretch young black minds and to set high enough goals for black children to achieve.

Secondly, black men desire to take care of their families and children like everyone else, but often resort to illegal drug activity as their only source of income. Without public policy initiatives which provide black males with access to relevant job skills, hopelessness will continue to reign.

Increased job skills are indispensable to moving black youth into an employable state and to remove feelings of rage and the "sense of hopelessness that makes criminality seem the only viable option."

Finally, rather than using explicit racial epithets to verbally insult black males, they are caricatured as second or third-rate citizens through the media, deficit-oriented discourse and by the inequitable distribution of resources, justice and opportunity (Harper, 2009).

There is a link between how one sees oneself and feedback received from society or others which leads to self-actualization. Young black males are likely to live "down to expectations" or respond to their negative portrayal by attempting to prove their perceived worth or legitimacy in dysfunctional ways (Roberts, 2005).

Yet there are thousands of young black males who have succeeded despite poverty or similar circumstances. They are thriving on college campuses. They serve in religious and non-profit institutions. They are making their mark in corporations, the public sphere and in legal firms.

Yet the experiences of those black males have been "overshadowed by the master narrative that amplifies black male under-achievement, disengagement" and dysfunction. What is critically needed is a counter-narrative of black male achievement and success.

To hear the voices and witness the stories of successful black male peers in order to learn how they triumphed over tragedy will provide the hope which contains the substance that has for too long been elusive.

Black males can have faith in a system in which they have finally come to know that they have opportunities and options which are viable.

If you are the successful bidder, where do we send the contract? (Quality Bar on Cherry Street)\_\_\_\_\_\_.



Are you bonded and licensed?

(No,but is Shayla Bell?)

If not, can you become bonded and licensed? (It depends when I can get out of the county jail and fill out the application)\_\_\_\_\_\_.

Are you related to anyone in the City of Toledo? (No, but if it will help, I can change my last name to Bell)\_\_\_\_\_.

Signed:

Well, when I read the above application, I thought the city hit a home run in that it would root out those misfits who only apply for that easy rehab money due to the city being careless in the bidding process.

Boy, was I wrong! The new application has apparently been a big hit with potential applicants to the point that the city has to again reconsider the whole bidding process.

Now, instead of 70 misdemeanor convictions that would make you ineligible, the city has trimmed that figure down to 65 convictions.

# The Josh Project Inc. to Hold Soul Food Swimming Fund Raiser

The Josh Project, Inc. invites you to its annual Soul Food for Swimming Fund Raiser, Sunday, December 11, 2011. This final major water safety event for calendar year 2011 will be held at the Indiana Ave Missionary Baptist Church; Stephenson-Roberts Fellowship Hall, 640 Indiana Ave. Toledo, Ohio.

Tickets are \$25.00 in advance and \$30.00 at the door. \$20.00 for children five-12, \$20.00 for seniors over 65 and under 5 Free. Doors open at 1:00 pm with food being served at 1:30 pm. A partial menu includes: turkey, dressing, fried chicken, mac & cheese, collard greens, candied yams, peach cobbler and more.

This year's program is from 2:30-4:30 pm. and will feature guest speaker Shaun Anderson, USA Swimming Foundation University Specialist. Anderson has extensive experience in developing swimming in underserved communities. Student Recognition starts at 3:00 p.m.

All proceeds are used to



continue The Josh Project Inc. mission to provide free swimming lessons and water safety training in the community.

Wanda Butts founded the Josh Project Inc. in 2006 after the drowning of her 16year son, John-Josh Butts, in August of 2006 at Bird Lake, Michigan, when the inflatable raft he was on capsized. Josh never had a swimming lesson and did not know how to swim at the time and could not save himself.

The Josh Project Inc. is a faith-based, not-for-profit organization formulated to teach, educate and empower youth, by offering educational opportunities in the area of water safety.

For a \$10 registration fee children between the ages of four-18 get four half-hour sessions of swimming instruction by qualified instructors in a safe environment and an opportunity to learn water safety. Lessons are held on Saturday afternoons at St Francis De Sales high school Natatorium.

To date The Josh Project has served over 800 students in the community since it began its mission.

 Statistics show that minority children drown 3.1
more times than white children. Executive Director
Tankeeya Butts, Wanda's
daughter and Josh's sister,
said: "Contributions by those
who want to assist The Josh
Project Inc. will help close
the gap and prevent unneces sary drowning in our com-

munity". Sarah Miller, of Toledo, age 67, retired nurse, commented: "I don't have any children, but I feel what the Josh Project is doing is commendable; I've contributed \$250 every year. It's money



well spent. We need to prepare our youth".

Contributions help cover the cost of swimming lessons for part of the year, purchase equipment, pay instructors, and secure a facility.

The Josh Project Inc. has partnered with many organizations in Toledo including the City of Toledo Police and Fire Department's Fire and Water Rescue division, U.S Coast Guard Auxiliary, W.L. Erie Division 16, Toledo Power and Sail Squadron. Greater Toledo Aquatic Club, RedCross "Safe Kids", Toledo Hospital's "Safe Kids", Lucas County Public Library, University of Toledo Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon, Ohio State University; 4 H division, Oblates of St. Francis De Sales High school, Kroger, USA Swimming Foundation and many other organizations, contributors, individuals and volunteers too numerous to list in this article.

In May of 2011, Toledo Mayor Mike Bell issued a proclamation designating May as Water Safety Month in Toledo. Toledo City Council President Wilma Brown presented the proclamation to The Josh Project Inc. founder, Wanda Butts.

The Josh Project Inc. has been featured on CBS News with Katie Couric, HBO Real Sports with Bryan Gumble, The New York Times, ABC News with Diane Sawyer and several local television stations and newspapers.

ports The Josh Project Inc. by providing financial assistance for a select number of children.

The Josh Project Inc. also works with USA Swimming Foundation to promote water safety and education.

USA Swimming is the National Governing Body for the sport of swimming in the United States, that promotes the culture of swimming by creating opportunities for swimmers and coaches of all backgrounds to participate and advance in the sport through clubs, events and education.

In 2008, USA Swimming commissioned The University of Memphis's Department of Health and Sports Services to study the swimming ability of urban minority groups in the United States.

The study, titled "Constraints Impacting Minority Swimming Participation-Phase I", identified the predominant barriers inhibiting swimming participation among minorities in the United States. The study use a sample comprised of underrepresented/minority youth between the ages of six and 16, from six metropolitan markets (Chicago, Houston, Memphis, Miami, Oakland and Philadelphia).

Some of the youth include respondents living at home with a level of income that qualifies for the Free/Reduce Lunch program.

Among the 2008 study findings, some of the variables discovered were the parent(s) ability to swim, parental encouragement, family swim participation, household income, education, and easy access/feeling safe at nearest pool.

Following up on the findings of the 2008 study, USA Swimming again with The University of Memphis in 2010 initiated Phase II of the "Constraints Impacting Minority Swimming Participation".

The 2010 study identifies children's true swimming ability and which factors most impact whether or not a child learns to swim. Some findings show 61 percent of the respondents reported low swimming ability with 10 percent unable to swim. Sixty-six percent of the Free/ Reduce Lunch recipients report no/low swimming ability. White respondents selfreported significantly higher swimming ability than black/ African American and Hispanic/Latino respondents. The study looked at income, education, access to swimming lessons and how often respondents visit swimming pools.

Drowning statistics among low-income children are alarming. Nearly 70 percent of African-American children and 60 percent of Hispanic children have little or no swimming ability compared to 40 percent of Caucasian children.

A Boston parent, who does not allow her child to swim shared: "I know how I am and she knows if I panic, if mommy feels like anything is going wrong, its over. As she starts getting comfortable, I will jump right in."

Kimberly Davis-Grable of Toledo has a son, Timothy, who is enrolled in The Josh Project Inc. swimming lessons. "Timothy has become more comfortable and experience in wate," said Davis-Grable. "Before the swimming lessons with (no fear), he would run with excitement to a pool (big or small), I



would gasp each time he ran for the water." Today Timothy takes pride in showing me how "not" to breathe under water, how not to run near a pool and how to wear a life vest at all times near the water.

Another parent stated, " Inreality too, you won'teven think swimming is that important until you're actually saying 'drowning', because now you're like 'what if my child drowns?' It never crossed my head. What would be, what would I do if it ever happened to my child?"

# **U.S. Navy Names New Ship in Honor of Voting Rights** Activist Medgar Evers

In an honor bestowed on only a handful of individuals, the United States Navy selected NAACP civil and voting rights icon Medgar Evers as the namesake of their newest ship. Christened in San Diego, California on November 12 by his widow Myrlie Evers-Williams, the USNS Medgar Evers (T-AKE 13) will serve as a supply ship for the Navy starting in the first quarter of 2012.

"I am just so honored for Medgar and all of the other people who gave their lives in the civil rights movement, particularly those in Mississippi. In my humble estimation, very few of them have received rightful acknowledgment of their contributions." remarked Evers-Williams. "He was a man who did believe in this country, and he believed in his people. He wanted things to be just and fair, and he was willing to work for that."

Medgar Wiley Evers, an Army veteran, was born and raised in Mississippi, where, after completing his military service in 1946, he returned to earn his degree from Alcorn Agricultural and Mechanical College (now Alcorn State University). After graduation, Evers began working on behalf of the NAACP in the fight to end segregation. In 1954, Evers became the first

NAACP state field secretary in Mississippi.

As field secretary. Evers organized boycotts and demonstrations to bring attention to the pervasive discrimination and urge an end to racial injustice. He also led the investigation into the murder of Emmitt Till, who, at the age of 14, was killed for talking to a white woman.

Evers may be best re-

secure voting rights for all Americans. He helped lead the charge for voting rights in Mississippi, organizing voter registration efforts across the state.

After returning from an NAACP meeting on June 12, 1963, Medgar Evers was assassinated outside his home by a member of the White Citizens' Council. Just two months before his murder. Evers anmembered for his fight to ticipated that his work for

civil rights would bring about his demise. "I expect to be shot anytime I step out of my car... if I die, it will be in a good cause.'

Evers murder served as one of the catalysts for President John F. Kennedy to request that Congress create a national civil rights bill.

"This is a truly special occasion," said NAACP president and CEO Benjamin Todd Jealous.

"Medgar Evers has been an inspiration to so many in the civil rights community and across the country. This honor by our Navy is befitting of his legacy."

"He was committed to his fellow human beings and the dream of making America a nation for all its citizens," said Navy Secretary and former Governor Ray Mabus during the dedication event.

USNS Medgar Evers is the 13th ship of the Lewis and Clark (T-AKE) Class of dry cargo ships General Dynamics NASSCO is building for the U.S. Navy. NASSCO began constructing USNS Medgar Evers in April 2010.

"Each ship in the T-AKE Class is named for a noted pioneer in our nation's history," said Fred Harris, president of NASSCO. "Mr. Evers was Army veteran of World War II and an important civil rights pioneer. The NASSCO team is proud to add Medgar Evers' name to this distinguished list."

# Mentor for Success: Feed God's Sheep

On October 29, 2011, Parkwood Seventh Day Adventist Church hosted a Harvest Fest kickoff event, which launched the Mentor for Success program. The game night was a success. Open to the community, kids poured in to played X-Box, Wii, air hockey, and many more activities.

The Mentor for Success program has been in effect but the help of Parkwood church is an extension of the program. Parkwood is teaming up with the police probation team to keep young people out of the court system. School officers have found an alternative, opposed to arresting students and sending them to jail.

For example, if a student gets into trouble at school that leads to an arrest, the court can recommend him or her for the success program to a police probation officer; the referral must be from the court system to the police. It will keep that child out of the court system and out of jail. This is the only program of its kind in Toledo and the surrounding areas.

Between January 2011 and the present (November 2011), the police probation team kept 150 kids out of the system. Now that Parkwood church members are involved, if they can take 150 students and the probation team officers take 100 students, together they have the potential to keep 250 kids out of the court system. The program happens for one month, two hours a week, which equals out to eight hours a month.

The project is situated between the Warehouse District Art Museum and the Toledo Museum of Art. UpTown is the home of the Avenue of the Arts and widely recognized as Toledo's upand-coming creative enterprise community. The project property comprises approximately 2.5 acres of land.

·Create green space ·Connect to nearby residential community and attract business investments to the neighborhood ·Improve storm wa-

The park has been designed with features such as a fountain that can be converted to performance space, a backdrop for outside film projection, amphitheatertype seating, built in game areas for children, pathways and sculpture pads, kiosks for vendors, a rain garden and native landscaping materials.

The commercial structure is an existing historic four story building. The building will serve as a beacon to creative individuals and companies that enjoy the benefits of working in close proximity. The first floor is envisioned as a combination food and beverage area and a multi-purpose space that can be utilized for performances, gallery, special events, etc. The upper three floors will be sub-divided to pro-

vide at least 30 office/ studio spaces.

The signature park (which will be named at a later time) is expected to be a major catalyst in the revitalization of the UpTown area. The creative arts are known to encourage investment in an area, attracting restaurants, entertainment venues and additional housing opportunities. A recent study by Bowling Green State University indicates that arts and culture industries generated over \$2.4 billion in economic activity in Northwest Ohio resulting in nearly \$250 million in federal, state and local tax revenues and over 33,000 jobs.

## **Book Review The Diversity Index: The Alarming Truth About Diversity** *in Corporate America... and What Can Be Done About It* by Susan E. Reed

Your customer base is changing.

You've been noticing it for the past few years: the face of your average client isn't what it used to be, not surprisingly. These new customers are savvier, they're men and women of all age groups, they're smart about where they shop, and they look like they're coming from around the world.

Let's face it: doing business today isn't like it was even 30 years ago. Your customers are different, but what about your staft? In the new book *The Diversity Index* by Susan E. Reed, you'll see how you can strengthen your workplace by letting go of certain archaic practices in hiring.

It doesn't take a leap of thinking to understand that a business that implements diversity is stronger in a global marketplace. Still, says Reed, almost "50 percent of the Fortune 100 companies employed no African, Asian, Hispanic or Native American men as executive officers in 2009." Furthermore, even today, workers are stymied by a "white ceiling" that may or may not exclude women in places of power.

So why aren't we doing better? Fifty years ago, the president and vice president of the United States thought we sould Colled the Blogs for

could. Called the Plans for Progress, several contracts were signed by Lyndon Baines Johnson and the presidents of several large defense corporations including Lockheed, Boeing and others. The contracts stipulated that the contractors would make efforts to locate, train, and employ minority workers and put them in management positions.

The NAACP dismissed

the idea as "nothing but hype."

As you might expect, politics got in the way of progress but the companies involved did succeed in integrating their all-white management teams. Consumers always helped the effort a little: when African Americans learned that there were no black salesmen at Coca Cola, they boycotted the product.

So what can you do to promote diversity in your business?

Fuse diversity goals with business strategy and provide diversity training to all employees. Create a global feedback system, affinity groups, and a way of measuring all managers. Cultivate new talent by encouraging education. Invest in the local community, promote people based on talent and never stop trying new ideas.

When Dad's busy in the kitchen, you're right there to set the table. If Grandpa needs someone to weed the garden with him, you grab your jacket and head outside. When Mom says company's coming, you help by picking up your toys. And if Grandma asks for a cookie taster, you always volunteer.

You're the best helper in your family, but who helps Santa? As you'll see in Musher's Night Before Christmas by Tricia Brown, illustrated by Debra Dubac, you might be surprised at the answer.

It was Christmas Eve and everyone at the North Pole was caught up in the excitement. All the elves were there, clapping for the guy in the red suit and listening to reindeer facts and weather reports.

# Senator Brown Announces Homeless Assistance Grants for the Toledo Area

State Senator Edna Brown (D-Toledo) joined the Ohio Department of Development and Ohio Controlling Board in announcing several local grants through the Homeless Assistance Grant Program totaling more than \$1 million.

"These grants will have an immediate impact on the Toledo area homeless population." Senator Brown said. "Homeless and low-income households are hit hard regardless of the economic climate and it's important to keep their plight in the forefront."

Recipients of Homeless Assistance grants in the Toledo-area are:

- \* Beach House, Inc. \$171,100
- \* Catholic Charities of Toledo \$201,900
- \* Harbor House 300 Beds, Inc. \$82,900
- \* Neighborhood Properties \$275,000
- \* Toledo Community Service Center \$353,000

The Homeless Assistance Grant Program provides grants to eligible applicants for emergency shelter, transitional housing, direct housing and permanent supportive housing activities that meet the housing needs of homeless and low-income families and individuals.

The grant program will release a total of \$15 million from the Housing Trust to address homelessness in several counties throughout Ohio. With the funds, approximately 31,000 Ohioans will be assisted.

The Controlling Board provides legislative oversight over certain capital and operating expenditures by state agencies and has approval authority over various other state fiscal activities.
