I Can't Speak

The Christmas story is about change, at its essence.

The story takes place during the political and economic disenfranchisement of a race of people by outside occupiers. Herod, the local ruler, is appointed by the Roman oppressors to maintain the status quo of privilege for elites and the subjugation of the powerless. The news of the birth of a child in the tiny and otherwise insignificant village of Bethlehem "troubles" Herod and he responds with state-sponsored violence upon the youth of the "marginalized, exploited and excluded" population from which the child emerges.

The fact that the narrative is centered on Jesus, as a child, is impossible to overlook. Young people have always been at the center of change.

It was four black college freshmen at North Carolina A&T who had a sit-in at the whites-only Woolworth lunch counter in February 1960. Four grew to over 400 participants in less than a week and the lunch counter was desegregated within six months. This incident changed the Civil Rights movement and American history forever.

However, most of us from that generation who are still around are tired now. We admit we are not for doing marches anymore. Our feet hurt and our bones ache. We are also fairly comfortable, living off the fruits provided by "the struggle." Besides, our militant spirit and past reliance on direct action as a fallback strategy have left us paternalistic and domineering in our relationships, even among ourselves.

One thing is certain though. The "Movement's" work is incomplete.

Piled high atop the gun violence, domestic violence and deaths OF and BY law enforcement are education-related problems. We have not been able to improve achievement test scores, dropout rates and suspensions/expulsions.

Employment statistics for African Americans, especially African-American youth, are abysmal. Support systems for African -merican youth are also crumbling and in many cases nonexistent.

Yet, the gasps from youth needing to be heard on current matters are often choked out by the aggressiveness of an older generation, which has a stranglehold on public discourse concerning the black community.

I am convinced, however, that like the biblical story of the birth of Jesus, we must focus on youth if change is to occur.

This week, a diverse socio-economic group of young people, through tears and testimonies, gave their perspective in a value-free environment devoid of judgment and adult criticism. For once, these black and white high school and college students, youth activists and young community

leaders talked while the adults listened.

What social justice activities are young people involved in locally?

A group in Toledo was represented which focuses specifically on #BlackLivesMatter and police brutality. The group is primarily made up of college students from the University of Toledo, Bowling Green State University and Lourdes University and has been meeting weekly since the police shooting of Michael Brown in Ferguson. Their purpose has been to bring awareness to the critical issues that impact the black community rather than blocking traffic or organizing die-ins to disrupt public activity.

Each Saturday, the group shows up for an hour at a particular Toledo location with protest signs. Protests have been held at the intersection of Monroe Street and Detroit Avenue to highlight the fact that the majority of arrests take place in our community although most crime takes place in other areas. The group has also held a protest at Dorr Street and Richards Road, the site of WTVG, the local American Broadcasting Co. (ABC) affiliate. ABC has broadcast an interview with Mike Brown killer officer Darren Wilson.

What are young people thinking?

Some recurring themes heard from the youth were:

- More than anything, we want clergy, nonprofits and professionals to be mentors, friends and supporters. We want someone to just give a damn about us even if it requires higher standards or personal change.
- Please don't preach to us.
- We do what we see others do, especially other adults.
- People don't understand the struggles experienced by the large number of us who live in extreme poverty. We are exposed to constant negativity, which causes us to socially disengage.
- We love our music and use it to cope for the tasks at hand.
- We want nice, expensive things just like everyone else. We think that the nation can solve our unemployment problem if it wanted to. We then could buy what we want.
- We have positive as well as negative experiences with the police.
- Our young, white friends are also harassed and disrespected by the police.

So, what can we, as parents and elders, do to support and empower youth for change-making?

If the promise of change in the coming of our youth is to be fulfilled, then their voices must be un-muted by providing a place at the table for them among our "contacts." Youth must participate in change-making efforts as full and equal partners.

As adults, we must also work on building trust with youth by doing more listening and refusing to allow the powers-that-be an opportunity to

Gas Below \$2/gallon? Part I

I remember my father becoming really upset in 1977/78 when gas soared to \$.77 a gallon! He was upset with the government for allowing foreign interests to dictate gas prices in the USA. Hmm.... Sound familiar? However, global energy economics will continue to dictate gas prices in the USA!

Why are gas prices so low now?

Northwest Ohio residents are able to find gas below \$2.00 a gallon. Twelve other states have locations where gas is less than \$2.00 a gallon as well. I recently (two days ago) filled my tank up for less than \$.50 a gallon! Can you believe that? (That's because I am in Saudi Arabia!) I will provide more on that in another article.

According to AAA, the average gasoline price in the U.S. today is \$2.39, the lowest since 2008 during the start of the Great Recession. What in the world is going on?

Well, it is a direct result of basic supply and demand. Adam Sieminski, administrator of the Energy Information Administration (EIA), the Energy Department's statistical arm, attributed the lower pump prices to lower prices for crude oil (due to higher oil inventories) and weak fuel demand.

Primary driver of low prices

The global price of Brent crude oil has fallen by 40 percent since

late June and closed at below \$60 per barrel last week. (Brent Crude is a major trading classification of sweet light crude oil that serves as a major benchmark price for purchases of oil worldwide.)

This is amazing for consumers and can serve as a catalyst for growth for the US economy. I anticipated this drop after we, Parker Energy Solutions, hosted the Regional Energy Forum 2.0 last March at The University of Toledo. However, I thought it would occur over the summer rather than in the fall and winter. (Jennifer Torres-Parker can confirm this!)

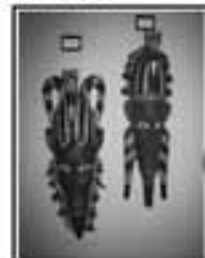

Ironically, I held a different view in the fall of 2012. During my Toledo TEDX Talk, I predicted that economic growth in the BRIC (Brazil, Russia, India and China) nations, combined with instability in the Middle East and other parts of global community would drive gas prices well above \$6.00 a gallon!

Again, why is this happening?

Oil production around the world has been exceptionally strong in recent years. The shale oil boom in the U.S. has pushed domestic production up 70 percent since 2008 as a result of the shale oil discoveries in North Dakota. Production is expected to reach 9.4 million barrels per day in 2015, an increase of four percent over this year and the highest domestic crude oil production since 1972.

Additionally, Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) members (Algeria, Angola Ecuador, Iran, Iraq, Kuwait, Libya, Nigeria, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and Venezuela), continue to produce oil at high levels. Specifically, Saudi Arabia (KSA), the world's largest producer oil, stated that it does not plan to cut production anytime soon. KSA intends to continue to produce over 9.6 million barrels/day in an effort to maintain its global market share.

OPEC members produce over 30 million bbl/d in aggregate. The US's oil production increase, combined with OPEC and non-OPEC oil producing countries, such as Russia, continued production, have increased oil inventory levels. Oil inventories are 124 million barrels higher on average compared with the same time last year. This is the largest year-over-year growth in November and December since 1997! Again basic economics – large inventory (supply) lower oil consumption (demand) = lower prices.

Why is oil demand so low?

Demand for fuel is growing slower than expected in Asia and Europe because of weak economic growth. Japan, specifically, one of the world's leading oil importers, has slipped into a recession. The US remains the largest consumer of oil. However, domestic fuel demand is trending lower as a result of changing driving habits and an influx of more fuel-efficient cars in the market. Moreover, energy efficiency strategies are being deployed across numerous industries throughout the US in an effort to increase profitability thus resulting in reduced oil demand as well.

How long will low gas prices last?

Energy experts around the world are debating this very issue. Many predict that the low prices will remain at this level throughout 2015. Major global oil producers such as Iran, Russia and Venezuela require oil to sell at closer \$100. More importantly, US shale oil producers' business model begins to crumble when oil prices dip \$70. This could force several of US shale oil producers out of business thus reducing supply. The impact on the



US economy could take a small hit as well, since the oil and gas industry has been the primary growth engine for the US economy over the last five years.

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Sens. Brown and Portman Announce Senate Passage of Resolution to Honor Ohioan, Olympian and Civil Rights Icon Jesse Owens

Brown's and Portman's Senate Resolution Honors Jesse Owens for Contributions to Athletics and Civil Rights, Humanitarian Efforts

Last week, U.S. Sens. Sherrod Brown (D-OH) and Rob Portman (R-OH) announced the passage of a Senate Resolution to honor Ohioan Jesse Owens. The resolution, introduced by Brown and co-sponsored by Portman, recognizes Owens – one of the greatest athletes and Olympians in world history, and a civil rights icon who singlehandedly discredited false theories of racial superiority at the 1936 Berlin Games.

“The legacy of Ohioan Jesse Owens will stand the test of time,” Brown said. “As an athlete, he won world records and Olympic gold medals while dominating his sport as few ever have or ever will. He became a global icon when – at the 1936 Berlin Games – he discredited the theory that the Aryan race was superior to others. And he concluded his life as an ambassador to the United States and an ambassador to the poor. But to achieve each, Mr. Owens had to endure hatred and bigotry from outside agitators and even the school and country he competed for and represented. For these efforts, he made Ohio, the United States, and the world a better place.”

“I am pleased that the United States Senate has chosen to honor the life and legacy of Jesse Owens. This Ohioan inspired a nation, stood up to tyranny, and helped advance the cause of racial equality through not only his athletic prowess, but the content of his character,” Portman said. “In the 1936 Olympics, his four gold medals exposed the lie at the heart of Nazism and made him an American hero.”

At the age of nine, Owens moved from Alabama to Cleveland, Ohio where he excelled as a track and field star – breaking two junior high school world records, and setting two and tying another high school world record. While a student and athlete at The Ohio State University, Owens could not live on campus due to a lack of housing for black students, and could not stay at the same hotels or eat at the same restaurants as his white teammates. But Owens endured and, at the 1935 Big Ten Conference Track and Field Championships, he set three world records and tied another—in a 45 minute span and with an injured back. Owens' most enduring legacy, however, was embarrassing the Nazi regime that hosted the 1936 Berlin Olympics by winning four gold medals, discrediting the false theory that racial disparity determined athletic achievement. Despite these accomplishments, Owens was neither recognized by Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt or Harry S. Truman. He was, however, named Ambassador of Sport by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1955, during which he advocated for social and economic justice.

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Bass Reeves: Tales of the Talented Tenth by Joel Christian Gill

Everybody needs a hero in their life.

Somebody to look up to. Somebody to want to be like some day, to follow and admire - perhaps a parent, maybe a grandparent or uncle. A friend or classmate might be your hero, or maybe even someone you don't know.

Or, as in the new book *Bass Reeves: Tales of the Talented Tenth* by Joel Christian Gill, your hero just might be a lawman.

George Reeves was a careful man.

His young slave boy, Bass, wanted to learn to read but Reeves "couldn't have that," so he taught Bass to shoot. Before long, the boy was one of the best sharpshooters Reeves had ever seen, and he decided to enter Bass in a few contests.

Nobody thought a slave could win a shooting match, but that's exactly what Bass did - over and over again. As he grew, so did his talent with a gun but though Bass won every competition, Reeves still treated Bass like a "family pet."

That continued for many years. Even during the Civil War, Colonel Reeves took Bass to the front with him as his personal slave - until Bass escaped.

Not knowing where he was, Bass ran until he was exhausted. He ran until he couldn't run any more, until he was rescued from near-death by a tribe of Native Americans who tended Bass's wounds and welcomed them into their village. They considered him family but Bass remembered how he'd been enslaved, so he left the village and returned to the battlefield, where he fought for the Union Army.

After the War was over, Bass married, started a family, and settled down to farm until, once again, duty called. Because Bass (who'd taken his former master's surname) had a good relationship with the Native Americans in the Territories, he was hired to be a U.S. Marshal. It didn't take long before he was deputized, and he began to make a name for himself. Word soon spread that a tall, black lawman was patrolling the territories and that, wherever he went, he left a silver dollar as a calling card. Bass Reeves was known to be smart, and he'd do anything to bring a criminal down.

Even when that criminal was his own son.

Though its back-and-forth timeline can be confusing sometimes - particularly in latter pages - I liked *Bass Reeves: Tales of the Talented Tenth* quite a bit.

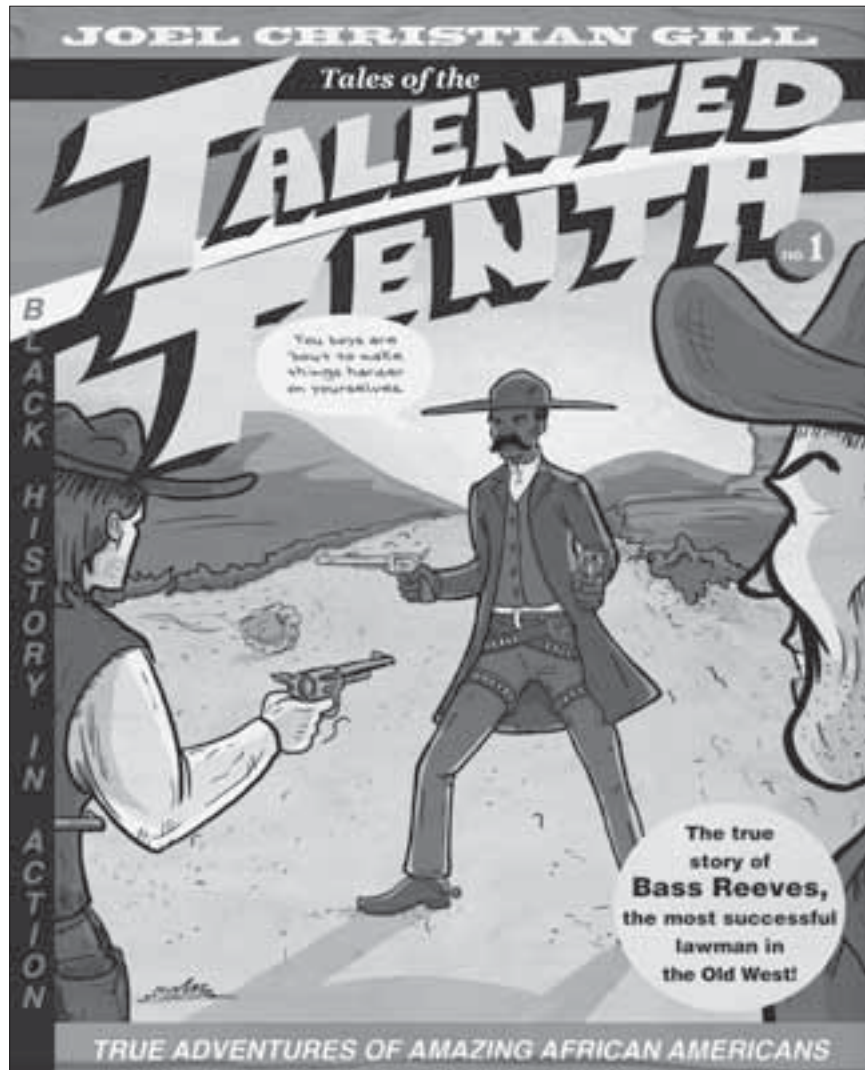
Based on little-known but true events, this is a story of action, honor, and the Wild West. That's very good, but what equally appealed to me was the way au-
